

Whiteman Park Birds



Whiteman Park is home to a significant number of bird species and offers visitors an excellent opportunity to see a range of native birds easily. Many species are residents here year-round, while others follow changes brought about by the seasons. Our three bush trails and the Children's Forest are all good places to spot birdlife, although some species can be readily seen within the parklands as well.



You can use this checklist to help identify and record the birds you observe when visiting Whiteman Park.

- The birds' wellbeing should always be maintained – do not chase, spook or flush them.
- Never physically touch a bird without extreme cause. If you come across an injured bird or animal, please call the Wildcare Helpline on 9474 9055 or Park management on 9209 6000.
- All native plants and animals are protected by law. Please do not disturb them in any way.
- The Park's bush trails are closed for public safety during Extreme and Catastrophic Fire Danger Rating days.
