Whiteman Park Birds



Whiteman Park is home to a significant number of bird species and offers visitors an excellent opportunity to see a range of native birds easily. Many species are residents here year-round, while others follow changes brought about by the seasons. Our three bush trails and the Children's Forest are all good places to spot birdlife, although some species can be readily seen within the parklands as well.

You can use this checklist to help identify and record the birds you observe when visiting Whiteman Park.
