Historic transport is so different... but also much the same!

HASS - HISTORY

How did kids used to get to the beach, school or the shops? Bring your class to investigate historic transport and find out what life was like in WA in the past. Your students will explore our transport collection using stories and role-play to understand change and continuity over time. Working as history detectives, they will make their own discoveries as they get hands-on with historic objects, dress up and props.

In this program, your Year 3 students will:

- ✓ Discover how transport has changed over time
- ✓ Find continuities between transport in the past and transport now
- ✓ Think about the impact of changing transport on people's lives
- ✓ Explore historic objects and photographs.

WHAT TO EXPECT



After an introduction to the museum, your students take on the role of detectives, searching for clues about life in the past. They will begin by looking at a story about family transport to the beach in 1960s Perth.



Next, students will engage in hands-on, mindson, self-directed learning. They will try out and examine three different types of transport from the 1960s as well as exploring costume typical of the time. Afterwards, your student detectives will reveal the clues they have found showing how transport and family life was different or the same 60 years ago.



Finally, they will go further back in time to the 1880s hearing another story supported with historic images. They will role-play going to school and shopping 140 years ago, supported by props and dress-up. Using their observation skills, they will make connections between their current knowledge and follow their imagination as they explore horse drawn transport and penny farthings.



We will conclude with a class discussion around their discoveries, focussing on how transport has changed over time and how those changes impacted people's lives.
