

FAST FORWARD: CARTS TO CARS



HASS - HISTORY

From cart to car rides, see the transformations in transport!

Join your guide from the year 1900 and go on a journey to explore the differences between 'then' and now, the past and present, horse carts and cars. This hands-on learning activity allows your students to examine real car parts from today and assist in harnessing a horse and cart from 1900. What comparisons will they make?

In this program, your Year 2 students will:

- ✓ Explore how transport technology and travel of the pass differs from what is used today.
- ✓ Compare and contrast modes of transport from the past and present.
- ✓ Have hands-on learning experience with real museum objects.

WHAT TO EXPECT



Stepping into the Time Machine, the class will meet their guide from 1900, using a timeline to understand how far apart they are in time.



In groups, students examine parts of car from today before presenting them to their guide and the class, explaining what they are used for and how they work.



Go on a tour of 1900 with your guide and examine transport modes from the past including a tram, a camel, a penny farthing!



Engage in hands-on learning as the class helps the guide to harness their horse and cart. Students will take this opportunity to compare the harness pieces with the car parts they examined earlier.



In small groups, students partake in some role-play using the horse and cart to imagine what it would have been like to travel on it.
